It is thanks to our partners — people and organizations who share our values and aspirations — that we are able to implement new projects, support meaningful change, and help those who need care and support.

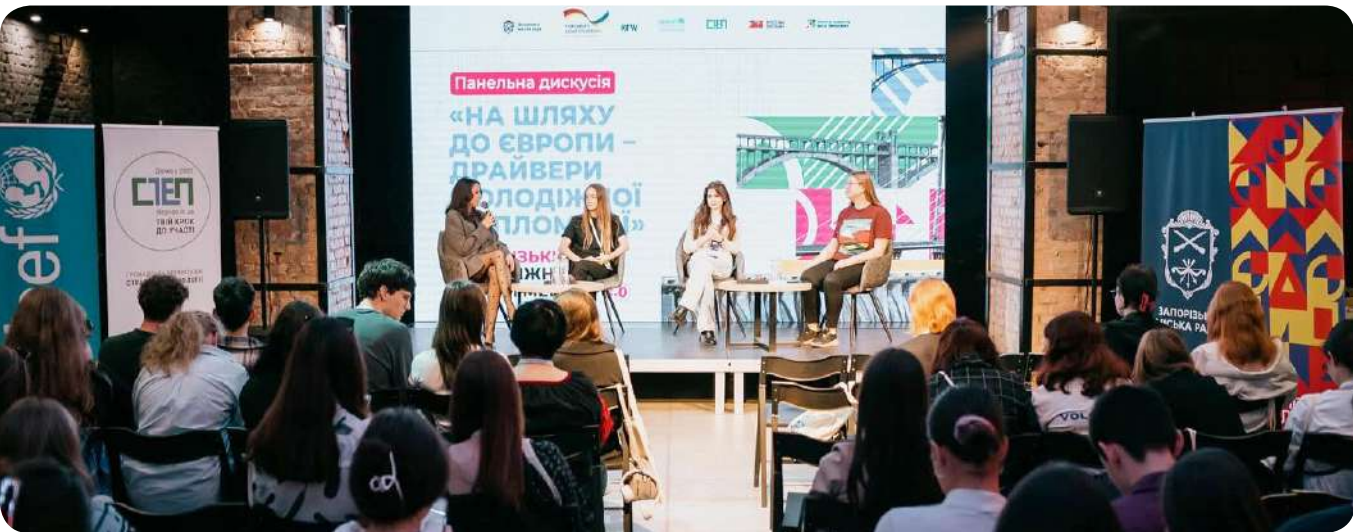
We are proud that throughout the year we had the opportunity to work with partners in ten regions of Ukraine. The geographic reach of our projects continues to grow — and so does the circle of our friends and like-minded counterparts. We are truly happy to contribute to positive change in communities across the country.

At the same time, our core team remains in Zaporizhzhia, continuing to work to support our home city.

Two years ago, in response to the challenges facing Zaporizhzhia, STEP launched projects focused on developing youth infrastructure and promoting inclusive education.

New youth centres in Zaporizhzhia, a city targeted youth programme, psychosocial support for children and families, and training for educators — these achievements are also the result of close cooperation with our partners, including donor organizations, municipal institutions, and colleagues from civil society.

We are sincerely and immensely grateful to everyone who stood by us and supported our work in 2025. And especially to those who remain in Zaporizhzhia, who share our hopes and dreams for a happy future for our city, and who are already working today to make that future a reality.



What we work for

We implement initiatives that foster the development of partnerships to strengthen and rebuild Ukraine and to help build a civilized, democratic, economically resilient, and people-centred society.

How we work

Our work is organized around a project-based approach. Each project is implemented by a dedicated team of managers and experts, assembled according to the project’s focus and specific needs.

In 2025, more than 20 volunteers and 30 experts were engaged in the administration and implementation of STEP’s projects.

Strategic priorities

Democratic and inclusive community development, and building partnerships between local authorities and civil society organizations to jointly respond to the challenges of wartime

Strengthening the capacity of local CSOs to influence development and recovery processes in their communities

Improving inclusive education and developing inclusive resource centres, as well as providing psychological and social support to families raising children with disabilities and children with special educational needs

Legal assistance and legal awareness, particularly for relocated communities, internally displaced persons (IDPs), and other vulnerable groups

Engaging young people in local decision-making, supporting the work of youth councils, and implementing youth leadership programmes

STEP's legal team provided free legal assistance to residents of Zaporizhzhia and Zaporizhzhia Oblast.

Our lawyers provided comprehensive support on housing, land, property, and other legal matters — from initial consultations to representation in court — helping people protect their rights and obtain the documents they needed

Areas of assistance

Establishing and protecting housing ownership rights: restoring documents, inheritance matters, registration in the state register, and other property-related issues arising from the war.

Support in obtaining compensation for damaged or destroyed housing, including submitting applications under the eVidnovlennia programme and to the Register of Damage for Ukraine.

Assistance with confirming employment records and protecting labour rights during martial law.

Assistance with social security and pension matters, including applying for or restoring payments and completing identification procedures for internally displaced persons.

Legal consultations on civil status matters, including obtaining the status of a person with a war-related disability.

Assistance with restoring and obtaining personal documents and establishing legally relevant facts, including confirmation of deaths that occurred in temporarily occupied territories.

Success stories

Restoring title documents and registering ownership to access compensation

Oleksandr*, who was forced to relocate to Lviv Oblast, was unable to register his ownership of a home damaged as a result of hostilities because he had lost a certificate of inheritance.

To restore the title document, a STEP's lawyer submitted a request to the notarial archive. Fortunately, the institution confirmed that a duplicate of the title document could be issued, but it did not have the technical documentation for the property. The next step, therefore, was to provide legal assistance in obtaining a duplicate inheritance certificate and arranging for the technical documentation to be prepared.

Thanks to this comprehensive legal support, Oleksandr was able not only to register his ownership rights in the State Register of Real Property Rights, but also to become eligible for compensation under the "eVidnovlennia" programme.

Obtaining a death certificate for a death that occurred in an occupied territory

Serhii's mother died in a temporarily occupied territory. He wanted to settle her estate in Ukraine but faced difficulties because he did not have the documents confirming her death.

From feedback on the STEP's legal team

A STEP's lawyer provided detailed guidance on the necessary actions and explained the procedure for obtaining a death certificate.

During the consultation, it became clear that Serhii did not have the original documents required to register his mother's death with the civil status registration authorities.

The lawyer helped him collect the necessary evidence and prepared an application to the court under special proceedings to establish the fact of death. The court opened proceedings and granted the application in full.

Based on the court's decision, Serhii registered his mother's death with the civil status registration authorities and obtained the necessary death certificate.

He can now exercise his right to settle his mother's estate.

Strengthening the Youth Policy in Zaporizhzhia City through establishing Youth Centre and Youth Council

in consortium with the NGO “Molod Online”, with the support of UNICEF and Zaporizhzhia City Council

This was a comprehensive, collaborative, and inspiring effort by a large team, resulting in tangible changes in the lives of young people in Zaporizhzhia.

The opening of the first City Youth Centre, mentoring for the Youth Council, advocacy for the city programme “Youth of Zaporizhzhia for 2025–2027”, and support for 13 youth-led initiatives — for us, these are more than just project milestones. They are success stories that we are proud of.

This collaboration helped create **sustainable infrastructure of opportunities for young people in frontline Zaporizhzhia** — from the Youth Centre, which offers quality activities and services tailored to the real needs of young people, to the Youth Council, which is able to effectively advocate for the initiatives of young people. The centre we established continues to operate a year after the project ended. And in June 2026, **a new branch of the Youth Centre** opened in Zaporizhzhia’s Khortytskyi District, also with UNICEF support.

A new hub for youth initiatives

In less than a year, the Zaporizhzhia City Youth Centre has become a hub of opportunities for young people. Everyone can find something interesting to do here, with all activities offered free of charge.

The centre’s main areas of work are career development, youth leadership, and personal development. Over six months, in cooperation with STEP and Molod Online, the staff delivered two rounds of a course for young entrepreneurs, organized training on civic engagement and volunteering, and held career sessions for schoolchildren in a “Living Library” format. These

educational activities were complemented by opportunities for quality leisure and socializing.

The centre regularly hosts craft workshops and SWOP fairs and runs a variety of interest-based clubs. Young people can also book the space for their own events, with youth workers providing support to help organize them effectively.

The programme of activities and range of services offered at the Youth Centre are based on the real interests and needs of young people in Zaporizhzhia, identified through a survey conducted on the U-Report platform.

Meaningful youth participation

As part of the project, a comprehensive training programme was delivered for the Youth Council under Zaporizhzhia City Council in 2024. In 2025, STEP and “Molod Online” continued to mentor the Council’s new term.

By contributing to the development of the city programme “Youth of Zaporizhzhia” and helping secure an increase in its implementation budget, the renewed Youth Council demonstrated that it is an effective platform for representing and advocating for the interests of young people.

Soon afterwards, the Council advocated for the introduction of discounted fares for students

on municipal public transport and initiated the inclusion of a dedicated provision on youth in the draft Charter of the City. Council members also contributed to the development of the Zaporizhzhia Youth Strategy and took part in focus groups within the “European Youth Capital 2025” programme.

Another important step was updating the Council’s Regulations and Rules of Procedure. This helped improve its work, facilitate the rotation of members, and strengthen the team. The Youth Council became more open and accessible to residents, while its initiatives attracted growing attention from local media.





Lucky thirteen: Youth ideas in action

Zaporizhzhia's first mini-initiatives competition

To give young people an opportunity to shape life in their city and bring about the changes they want to see, we launched the **Mini-initiatives competition** together with our partners. CSOs and youth groups with no previous project implementation experience were eligible to apply.

The jury selected **thirteen youth-led ideas**. Active young people promoted astronomy, created new community spaces, played volleyball, football, and table tennis, learned new skills, and shared their knowledge with peers, friends, and colleagues. Five youth teams received grant funding for their own projects for the first time. Winning the competition inspired them to seek additional resources to bring new ideas to life.

Feeling. Creating. Living.

An initiative group helped 200 young people learn how to care for their mental well-being through art therapy practices and individual self-recovery strategies.

The project successfully combined educational and therapeutic components, allowing participants to immediately integrate new knowledge into their own emotional experiences.

School of Change

The Children's Music School No. 5 organized a series of environmental activities involving young students and their families — from planting flowers around the school to a community clean-up on Khortytsia Island, from the interactive "Sounds of Nature" exhibition to the "Second Life of Things" upcycling art project.

Young Psychologist Academy

The Regional Institute of Postgraduate Pedagogical Education implemented a training programme for young psychologists working in the school education system.

Participants took part in simulation exercises and workshops led by the institution's leading educators and also worked with real-life cases.

"We planned to make this an annual academy... If we can secure funding to run it on a long-term basis, we will keep the same format. If not, we will scale down the programme. We have already discussed this with the administration, and it has been agreed and included in the plans."

Making for Change

Young people created an eco-friendly space in the area surrounding the City Youth Centre. Together with youth workers, they installed benches and waste bins made from compressed plastic and reclaimed wood at the PlasticOn workshop. All the creative solutions were developed by designers from Zaporizhzhia.

Rooftop Vibes

Another project created by the Youth Centre community. At their initiative, a comfortable summer terrace was set up on the centre's rooftop, providing an additional informal space for events. Following its completion, the terrace hosted painting and craft workshops, yoga classes, and psychological support sessions.

From Words to Action

The NGO "Youth in Motion" created a mural featuring an important landmark and symbol for the residents of Vasylivka city territorial community, while also representing the strength of youth resistance in the temporarily occupied territories of Zaporizhzhia Oblast.

The Last Activist

Zaporizhzhia Legal Alliance developed a simulation-based card game designed to build skills in organizing community events and volunteer projects.

Throughout the summer, the team ran a series of games at universities and colleges in Zaporizhzhia, youth centres, and a youth festival in the neighbouring Shyroktivska village territorial community.

Astro Quest

Perhaps the most romantic of the science education initiatives, Astro Quest promotes astronomy among young people. The project featured events with scientists, as well as an astronomy picnic — nighttime observations of the starry sky on Khortytsia Island.

FREETIME Summer Platform

A new youth space was created at Zaporizhzhia Polytechnic National University. The project also offered students a range of activities, including an environmental clean-up, debates, art workshops, and poetry evenings.

"This was my first experience writing a mini-grant application. It was really interesting, and we are already working on another application."

Street Music Festival

More than ten young local music bands presented their work. Despite having to hold the street music festival in an air raid shelter due to safety concerns, the performers shared their energy and enthusiasm with the audience, making the event no less memorable.

Sports Tournaments

Two youth-led groups initiated table tennis, volleyball, and football tournaments between schools and universities. The success of these events demonstrated the strong demand for youth sports activities in Zaporizhzhia.

European Youth Capital 2025

with the support of UNICEF and the TVORY! network (Lviv), in partnership with the NGO “Molod Online”

Zaporizhzhia was selected as one of three cities to participate in the National Youth Policy Development Programme, implemented by the team behind “Lviv — European Youth Capital 2025”.

Together with our partners, we supported the development of Zaporizhzhia’s first Youth Strategy. The process began by building a community of ambassadors who became the driving force behind the initiative.

This was followed by a series of focus groups and sectoral meetings, a sociological survey of young people, and a public discussion of the draft Youth Strategy.

The programme culminated in the large-scale ZAP!FEST event, which brought together active young people, civic initiatives, businesses, and educational and creative communities from across Zaporizhzhia.

Zaporizhzhia also became one of 17 Ukrainian cities competing for the title of **“Ukrainian Youth Capital 2026”**. The nationwide competition recognizes communities that consistently develop youth policy, support youth initiatives, and create opportunities for young people to fulfil their potential.

Subgrants for youth-driven change

Zero Space Zp >> Shop Smart!

The team developed and tested a board game that teaches eco-friendly habits and shows how small everyday decisions can make a difference in the life of a city. It is the first environmental board game in Zaporizhzhia designed specifically for young people. Game sets are available at youth centres across the city.

Cultprojector >> Hyperlink Generation

The project created a space where teenagers could explore digital art, learn how to present themselves, and create their own works. The programme included lectures, discussions, and workshops, culminating in a digital art exhibition.

Vilni UA, Centre for Support of Civic Initiatives >> About Ukrainian: Youth in Culture

The team organized a series of tours, workshops, and creative sessions that helped young people learn more about their city and its history. Participants not only explored the city’s identity but also created their own cultural works.

Radio Na Dotyk >> The City for Youth

The Radio Na Dotyk team developed the first youth podcast guide explaining how city services work and where to turn in different situations. The project promoted greater transparency in the work of municipal institutions, while giving young residents their first city navigation tool created specifically for them.

Studentstvo NGO >> StandArt: European Standards Through the Eyes of Young People

The project helped young people see how European standards can be put into practice at the community level. Participants learned to work with the local context, formulate ideas, and propose practical solutions for the city. The project resulted in a Collection of Initiatives that can be used to address community needs and support the development of youth policy.

Youth in Action NGO >> Movement of Unity

Young people from the relocated Vasylivka initiated the creation of an accessible sports space at a community humanitarian hub. It hosts open activities for children and young people, as well as training on inclusion and teamwork.

HeroU NGO >> Art for Change

The project provided an entry point into civic activism for young people who wanted to make a difference but had not yet felt ready to take action on their own. A training programme was developed specifically for them, covering leadership, soft skills development, time management, advocacy, fundraising, and cooperation with civil society. Participants worked on their own ideas, learned how to engage partners, find resources, and communicate with the community in order to successfully implement civic initiatives.

Circle of Impact: Strengthening CSO leadership in community recovery and development

with the support of the National Endowment for Democracy

Through the project, we are helping 16 civil society organizations strengthen their capacity to influence important processes and decisions in their communities.

At the first stage, leaders of local CSOs took part in a six-month training programme covering a range of organizational development topics — from strategic planning to building effective partnerships and networks.

Participants also had the opportunity to take part in mentoring sessions with professional media outlets. The teams not only received valuable advice and improved their communications, but also established new partnerships with media organizations and developed joint content.

Following the training, nine organizations received support to implement their own advocacy and impact projects.

It was only through this programme that we really understood what impact means. We used to think that when you have an idea, turn it into a project, implement it, conduct a survey, that is already impact. But every project could go much deeper... And, in general, projects should be designed with their future impact in mind.

From local changes to sustainable impact

What project participants are working on in 2026

Sustainable Development Platform

"Perspective" will share its advocacy experience with colleagues across the region. The team will engage CSOs in Poltava Oblast and equip them with practical tools for influencing important processes in their towns and villages.

NGO "Power of Podillia" from Vinnytsia will teach youth how to understand budget processes, engage with local authorities, and develop their own projects. Young people will not only strengthen their financial and legal literacy but also put their new knowledge into practice by preparing applications, developing budgets, and submitting them to grant competitions.

NGO "ILLUMINE" will continue its strategic work to promote women's leadership in Reshetylivska community. The team will implement a training programme for women who want to find their place in the civil society sector or a new field, start their own business, or launch their own project.

CF "100% LIFE. Kyiv Region" will help partner communities develop and implement conflict-prevention policies and procedures. The organization's ultimate goal is to strengthen the role of civil society in the recovery of Kyiv Oblast, including by enabling CSOs to participate more effectively in working groups and advisory bodies in their communities and the region.

Center for Development and Cooperation of the Community will analyze the existing tools of the Smart Region digital platform and programmes related to participatory budgeting in Poltava Oblast. The NGO's experts will conduct focus groups with residents, develop proposals for changes, and advocate for their official adoption.

"ICan" Charitable Foundation will initiate a series of dialogues in Kharkiv involving women's CSOs, local authorities, and gender policy experts. Together, they will identify women's needs in the areas of safety and urban recovery and develop proposals for integrating gender-responsive approaches into local policies. This document will provide a basis for strategic advocacy on behalf of women in Kharkiv.

NGO "Green Bucha" will engage residents in updating the local environmental programme through surveys and public events. The team will also run an advocacy and media campaign promoting environmental solutions for the community.

"DOBRO" Community Development Foundation will lay the groundwork for launching public monitoring of the Odesa City Strategy. Activists will develop a clear system of indicators, propose digital solutions, and prepare practical recommendations for local authorities.

NGO "Buchach-ART" plans to transform the formal process of developing the 2034 Strategy and Charter into an open dialogue about the future of Buchach community. To this end, activists will hold a series of public meetings and discussions at the Buchach Art Yard, a popular local venue, develop thematic information materials, and produce joint publications with local and national media.

Adaptive sports for veterans

with the support of UNDP Ukraine

Adaptive sports are more than simply restoring physical fitness. They are about psychological stability, trust, teamwork, a sense of support, and returning to an active life.

In this project, we addressed not only the physical aspects of recovery but also stress, traumatic experiences, emotional support, and the professional resilience of specialists who support people returning from the war.

- ☑ Delivered training for coaches working with veterans
- ☑ Strengthened the professional capacity of specialists from relevant city departments.
- ☑ Organized mentoring sessions featuring discussions of real-life cases involving work with veterans.
- ☑ Purchased equipment for adaptive training, now used by one of the city's municipal sports and physical education centres.

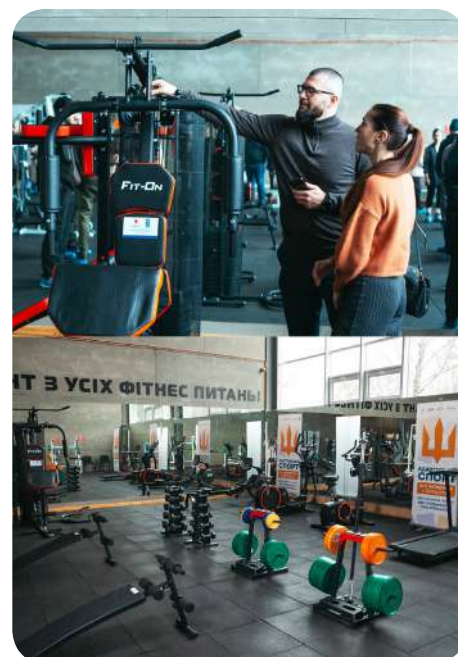

Integrated Education, Child Protection, Resilience and Inclusion to war-affected, vulnerable, IDP children and caregivers in North and East of Ukraine

with the support of Lumos Foundation

The project focuses on supporting the most vulnerable families, including IDP families, large families, single-parent households, and families raising children with disabilities.

Mobile teams of qualified educators and social workers provide comprehensive psychosocial support through consultations and case management. The project also provides legal assistance to children, their parents, and guardians, including support with applying for compensation for destroyed property, submitting claims to the Register of Damage, and obtaining legal statuses and benefits.

Another important area of support from the Lumos Foundation is the provision of educational kits with tablets, learning materials, and art therapy resources for children with special educational needs. These assistive tools make it easier for students to access remote or blended learning.

The project also included training for teachers on providing psychological first aid to children, helping to strengthen the community of professionals in Zaporizhzhia equipped to support children in the face of the challenges of wartime.

Other significant achievements in 2025

Key partnerships, events, and opportunities for growth

Strengthening the team

Big projects are never accomplished alone. In 2025, we implemented a project in a consortium for the first time — with the NGO “Molod Online”. Our shared success confirmed the effectiveness of this approach. Combining the strengths of our organizations and supporting each other at every stage helped us not only fully achieve the project’s objectives but also strengthen both teams. Today, we continue to work closely with our colleagues and draw on their expertise in our work with young people.

Events that make a difference for youth

2025 was packed with large-scale events for young people that we organized together with UNICEF, Zaporizhzhia City Council, the NGO “Molod Online”, and other partners. The MEET-UP 2.0 Youth Forum, the “PLYN” career fairs, Europe Day, Youth Day, and ZAPIFEST were among the year’s most memorable and energetic moments.

Legal Development Network

Since 2021, STEP has been a member organization of the Legal Development Network. This partnership helps us strengthen our legal projects and systematically enhance the professional capacity of our lawyers. In 2025, with the support of the Network and the

GlobalGiving platform, our specialists provided consultations, legal awareness sessions, and group sessions for IDPs and representatives of relocated communities in Zaporizhzhia.

Internal policies and standards

Last year, STEP successfully completed a micro-assessment for UNICEF implementing partners and adopted a number of important policies covering financial management, procurement, and project and programme management. Through our cooperation with the Lumos Foundation, the organization also gained practical tools for making our events and programmes more inclusive.

STEPping forward

Our team is committed to continuing to grow, working in new local contexts, and testing new approaches. In 2025, we launched a project supported by the National Endowment for Democracy (NED), bringing together CSOs from across Ukraine as our partners for the first time. Moreover, the project includes an “experimental” component focused on cooperation between civil society and independent media.

Together with our project participants, we are also learning how to tell the story of our work more effectively.

New projects and partnership initiatives

Expanding our programmes and geographic reach

Strengthening the capacity of municipal youth centres and youth councils in Dnipro and Zaporizhzhia Oblasts

In 2026, STEP is continuing its cooperation with UNICEF to advance youth policy. Through the new project, we are scaling up our experience of establishing a youth centre and training youth council members in Zaporizhzhia to territorial communities in Dnipro Oblast. To achieve this, we are working with regional and local authorities, expanding our network of regional coordinators, and creating new opportunities for young people. This time, we are also placing particular emphasis on a new component — Career Trajectory.

Life Without Barriers — free legal aid and humanitarian support

Together with our partners at the “Posmishka UA” Charitable Foundation, we are expanding access to free legal assistance in Zaporizhzhia, Dnipro, Kharkiv, Sumy, and Donetsk oblasts. Our lawyers help people address issues ranging from restoring documents and accessing social benefits to obtaining compensation for damaged or destroyed property and resolving other legal matters arising from the war. The project is funded by the Ukraine Humanitarian Fund.

Voices of Memory: Preserving Jewish heritage in Southern and Eastern Ukraine

In partnership with UNESCO Ukraine and with financial support from the European Union in Ukraine, we have launched an educational initiative aimed at preserving, researching, and promoting the rich Jewish heritage of southern and eastern Ukraine. The project will feature lectures and discussions for everyone interested in history and cultural heritage. Its key outcomes will include the creation of a historical “Memory Route” highlighting Jewish heritage sites in Zaporizhzhia and an interactive video tour.

Beekeeping: A path to self-employment

Back in 2021, we introduced young people to beekeeping as a potential field of employment. In 2026, we are returning to the topic, this time working with adults who are looking for knowledge and start-up support to launch their own businesses in beekeeping. Project participants will learn the basics of entrepreneurship, finance, marketing, and online sales. They will also receive specialized equipment and support in developing a business plan. The initiative is implemented as part of ISAR Ednannia’s “Unity for Community” project, co-financed by the European Union and the MINDERO Foundation.
